Membership Numbers

As of October 31st, 2023 the Club memberships stood at: Honorary Life 8 Regular 90 Social 16 Total 114 Temporary Withdrawal 3 **Net change to total memberships from November 2022.** -13

During the year the club gained six new memberships but during the same period the club lost members who resigned (5 regular, 8 social) and regular members transferred to social memberships (6).

Attracting new members to the club is a vital part of sustainability for SCYC, the incoming Executive is planning for a membership drive in the coming year.

Rear Commodore – Doug Herchmer

There were major changes made to the cruising program this year with the elimination of cruising stations/agreements and the adoption of a member reimbursement policy for prepaid moorage. Members could stay at 15 selected marinas scattered from the Gulf Islands, Sunshine Coast and Desolation Sound to the Broughton's. There were no restrictions on overnight stays or consecutive nights but there was a cap of \$300/member. Eligible members are now required to register and pay beforehand and submit their moorage receipts along with a reimbursement form up until the end of September. The cruising season is now April 1- September 30. Cruising program usage was down considerably from previous years with only 101 overnight stays enjoyed by 32 members at a cost of \$8062 out of a budget of \$16,500.

Members were reimbursed via e-transfers from the Treasurer which appeared to work well for most. It is recommended that the existing list of Preferred Moorage Facilities be reviewed with the idea of adding a few more marinas and deleting some that were not utilized. At a meeting between Fairwinds/SCYC in late January, the club was advised that our lease for the Afterdeck would not be renewed, and we would have to vacate the marina by September 1 of this year. A small committee was formed, and the facility was put up for sale in May. A farewell party was held in late June and the contents removed to offsite storage while a few of the major items were sold to members. Only 2 bids were received with the highest one at \$ 3300 and the lowest at \$ 1000. The successful bidder towed the building away on August 28 and it is now anchored off Deep Bay and for sale on Craig's List for \$ 60,000.

The Council of BC Yacht Clubs and its' associated organization, the BC Marine Parks Forever Society continues its' stellar representation of yacht clubs and recreational boaters across BC. During the past year, the COBCYC revamped their website to reflect current issues and past accomplishments in an attempt to gain more awareness and recognition among the boating public. A major issue that was flagged to the Council involves the Community Marina at Ladysmith Maritime Society, which has been a cruising station for many years and is one of our premier go-to marinas included in our revamped cruising program. The Town of Ladysmith has issued an eviction notice to LMS and to cease operations by December 31 of this year. It is a very complicated situation involving the Province, the Stz'uminus First Nation, Ladysmith and LMS. It concerns the Reconciliation Agreement signed between the Province and SFN in 2022 and involves the transfer of the marina lease from the Town of Ladysmith to the SFN without meaningful discussion with the LMS. Consequently, our club has written letters of support to the Province and the Town of Ladysmith urging them to intervene and help facilitate talks between the SFN and LMS.

There is a concern that unfavourable precedents may be set for other water lot tenures at some of the major marinas on the Coast.

The stern-tie advisory committee of the MPFS was busy this summer and along with BC Parks Staff and the Facility Operator for Jedidiah Island were able to replace the chains and shackles on 18 existing stern ties and added high visibility markers to make them more easily seen from the water. Other prospective stern tie sites within BC Marine Parks have been identified and are awaiting approval from local First Nations (Harmony Islands, Sabine Channel, Gulf Islands NPR). New mooring buoys at D'Arcy Island have been successfully installed in conjunction with Parks Canada and they have shown renewed interest in the stern-tie program within the Gulf Islands NPR.

Peter Stockdill (former SCYC member) continues to review new and existing Water Use License Applications up and down the coast as they relate to boating especially how they might impact anchoring, water and foreshore rights, marine park expansion proposals and environmental issues concerning aquaculture operations. The "Connected Coast Project" which is being undertaken by BC Crown Lands. continues along the BC Coast and is mostly completed but with many problems of cable breakage. This is a massive project involving the installation of fibre optic submarine cables for the North Coast, Sunshine Coast, and the East and West Coast of Vancouver Island. Concerns involve the laying of cables in recognized anchorages and landing locations without proper warning signs.

After 4 years in the position of Rear Commodore and previously 2 as Staff Captain, I have decided to step aside and retire from the Board of Directors. It has been an enjoyable and rewarding experience and I thank all the club members and Board Directors for their support over these years.
